Philip Ellis has been conductor of the Birmingham Royal Ballet since 1990. Equally at home with new work, contemporary music and dance styles, he is in demand as a guest conductor, appearing regularly with The Royal Ballet at Covent Garden, Paris Opera Ballet, La Scala Ballet, Mikhailovsky Ballet, and Australian Ballet.

Philip combines broad experience and musicality from many years as a concert conductor working with orchestras such as the Philharmonia, London Philharmonic, Royal Philharmonic, BBC Philharmonic, and the Hallé. He has made many recordings with the Philharmonia and Royal Philharmonic Orchestras.

Hailing from North Wales, and shortlisted for the Cadaqués and Besançon International Conducting Competitions, Robert (cover picture) is Artistic Director of the awardwinning NEW Sinfonia, the Orchestra in Residence at North Wales International Music Festival, and a regular guest conductor at Manchester Camerata.

Robert's collaborative approach to building trust with musicians has been shaped by his early professional career as a viola player, where he notably played with the Royal Liverpool Philharmonic Orchestra, the Orchestra of Opera North and alongside the Allegri and Edinburgh String Quartets

Robin Wallington is a versatile young conductor/composer with a reputation for dynamic performances across a wide range of contemporary and established repertoire. He has worked with ensembles such as the London Symphony Orchestra, BBC Philharmonic Orchestra, Manchester Camerata, Psappha, and Northern Ballet Sinfonia.

Robin regularly works as an arranger for the BBC Philharmonic and String Infusion. His arrangements have been broadcast on national and local radio stations and he conducted his own orchestral arrangements for the 2022 Children in Need television broadcast.

Agata Zając is a Polish conductor who started her musical path as a violinist.

After conducting studies at the Poznań Academy of Music she completed her postgraduate degree at the Chopin University of Music in Warsaw.

Agata was a finalist in the conducting competitions of the Orchestre National d'Île-de-France, and Hallé and in 2021 was invited to the Donatella Flick Conducting Competition with the London Symphony Orchestra. She was conductor-in-residence with the Sudeten Philharmonic for 2020/2021 and in September 2022 joined the RNCM as the Mills Williams Junior Fellow in Conducting.

Rachmaninov Symphony No 2

Rhapsody in Blue occupies a special place in American music: it introduced jazz to classical concert audiences and simultaneously made an instant star of its composer. Martin James Bartlett recorded it with the London Philharmonic orchestra and has played it across the world to great acclaim.

As for the Rachmaninov, never has there been a symphony so rich in sweeping, majestic, extended melodies. The Finale, in a triumphant E major, begins like a whirling dance, succeeded by one of the high points of the symphony, the definitive Rachmaninov Big Tune. The glowing, eloquent theme unfolds sumptuously and a stirring coda brings the symphony to a resplendent conclusion.

Warren Mailley-Smith has given acclaimed solo recitals at The Wigmore Hall and Carnegie Hall and has performed for the British Royal Family on numerous occasions. He has 40 piano concertos in his repertoire, and has made his concerto debut with the Royal Philharmonic Orchestra. He was the first British pianist to perform Chopin's complete works for solo piano from memory in a series of 11 recitals. His latest recording includes the work featured tonight, Chopin's popular first concerto, soon to be released.

It's Remembrance Day and Poland's Independence Day so with thoughts of recent conflicts, Polish conductor, Agata Zając will also lead us through a short work written in memory of thousands of Polish nationals, victims of mass execution by the Soviet regime in 1940. We finish with perhaps Shostakovich's most popular work; itself a Russian composer's response to repression. "I think it is clear to everyone what happens in the fifth. It has never been agreed whether the Symphonic Prelude was written by Bruckner or Mahler but either way it's a great way to start a concert. Elgar in the South, while written in and influenced by the local music of Liguria is unmistakably Elgar with its wistful, poignant viola solo. And in the second half we travel to Bohemia for two of its most celebrated sons. Kodaly's Dances is based on the folk music of Galanta, now part of Slovakia. Dvořák was an enthusiast of the folk music of Moravia and his eighth symphony is one of the warmest, most optimistic in his symphonic cycle.

Mahler's Blumine is "a heartfelt, rapturous trumpet melody that neartfeit, rapturous trumpet melody that alternates with melancholy song on the oboe ...lovers exchanging their tender feelings in the stillness of night." Follow that! Well actually in a competition for melody, Bruch scores pretty well and with Mahler's fourth, we have the shortest of his symphonies, all sunshine. warmth and good humour concluding with a sublime depiction of a child's idea of heaven where wine costs 'not a penny', St Martha does the cooking, and angels sing to St. Cecilia while baking bread!
