# **INVITATION TO** THE DANCE

THE 2025/26 SEASON



It may seem an odd title for a season of classical music by a symphony orchestra but hear us out.

There is a fine thread of dance running through this year's season; some obvious, some less so. There is the music to accompany ballets: the drama and passion of Romeo and Juliet; the soaring romanticism of Swan Lake and sheer visceral excitement of *The Firebird*. There are the borrowed Scottish dances of Arnold's popular suite and then there is the less obvious.

Beethoven's 7th Symphony, a work once described by no less a figure than Richard Wagner, as "the apotheosis of the dance" is one of Ludwig's most energetic, joyful and rhythmically led compositions and there are hints of African-American juba dance once practised on U.S. plantations in Florence Price's piano concerto.

And if that isn't enough to whet the appetite we bring yet more top class soloists to Stockport: the outstanding Annemarie Federle, appointed Principal Horn at the LPO in 2023 when still in college, Clare Hammond, renowned pianist who thrilled us with her Rachmaninov last season, a Stockport debut for Latvian pianist, Antonina Suhanova, Anna McCargow, winner of our competition in March, Kathryn Rudge, star mezzo-soprano of concert stage and opera, and back with us again, Stockport's own classical superstar, Jennifer Pike.

Enjoy the season and see what other dance motifs you can spot during the year. Every concert has one - or more!

Then after Swedish composer Larsson's sweetly yearning, poignant incidental music for Shakespeare's Winter's Tale, we move to the drama, romance and spectacle of Prokofiev's coruscating ballet music for Romeo and Juliet.


SUNDAY MATINÉE 3.00P



## WINTER DAYDREAMS

Arnold Four Scottish Dances

Beethoven Piano Concerto No 5

Tchaikovsky Symphony No 1 'Winter Daydreams'

With sounds of bagpipes, reels and Scotch snap rhythms, Arnold's dance suite conjures up vivid images of Scotland with comic elements in the shape of a tipsy bassoon and moments of calm in a slow, graceful melody evoking thoughts of a calm day in the Hebrides and Scottish ballads like the Skye Boat Song.

The concerto this evening is one of the most popular works in classical music. Our soloist is the wonderful Anna McCargow, winner of our own international young musicians competition last March who joins us this evening from Germany.

Tchaikovsky's first attempt at symphonic form remained one of his favourites. Although its composition took its toll on him, at a point where he had four symphonies behind him he wrote: "It has more substance and is better than any of my other more mature works". A symphony of charm and melody with hints of Russian folk music. Tom Service called it "one of the most ... attractive first symphonies ever written" with an "irresistibly over-the-top conclusion".

## WOMEN OF NOTES

Doreen Carwithen Bristol Rock Dorothy Howell Lamia Florence Price Piano Concerto Bartók Concerto for Orchestra

A trio of long-neglected female composers make up the first half of this concert. From Buckinghamshire, Birmingham and Arkansas in the late 19<sup>th</sup> and early 20<sup>th</sup> centuries, their music has been unfairly overlooked, victim to an undoubted gender bias and misogyny as well as, later, the fashion for modernism, it is now enjoying something of a revival.

Lamia, based on the Keats poem of the snake transformed into a woman, was particularly successful when composed by a very young Howell ("the English Strauss") and was so popular it was played at six subsequent seasons of the Proms but then, after 1940, not again until 2010; Florence Price was the first black woman to have a symphony performed by a major orchestra; Carwithen, as well as writing for the concert stage, was the first woman anywhere in the world to work full-time as a film composer.

And we conclude, in the second half, with one of Bartók's most popular, and accessible works - an orchestral tour de force.

A joyous work, Wagner described Beethoven's seventh symphony as "the apotheosis of the dance; dance in its most exalted form". Tonight we welcome to the SSO Euan Shields to conduct this exhilarating work alongside the Strauss Horn Concerto with Annemarie Federle and Mozart's Prague Symphony.

We are delighted to be introducing two musicians to Stockport on stellar career paths.

Annemarie Federle, is well on the way to becoming a star among the world's French horn players. In 2020 she was a finalist in the BBC Young Musician Competition. Three years later, still at the Royal Academy of Music, and just 20, she was appointed Principal Horn of the London Philharmonic Orchestra and is now also principal with the Aurora Orchestra and performing with many of the major UK orchestras, as well as the Bavarian Radio Symphony Orchestra in Munich.

Raised in Japan and the USA, in 2023, Euan Shields captured global attention by winning the prestigious Siemens Hallé International Conducting Competition and is now in his second season as assistant conductor at the Halle





JENNIFER PIKE'S TCHAIKOVSKY

After the invigorating Finlandia we are delighted to welcome back the fabulous
Jennifer Pike with the ever-popular
Tchaikovsky concerto which she first played
with the SSO in 2018.

In the second half, along with Karelia, we bring you the dance feature. And what a feature to close the season! Stravinsky's Firebird, premiered in Paris in 1910, propelled the composer to instant fame and success. Diaghilev is said to have remarked in rehearsal "Mark him well, he is a man on the eve of celebrity". And so it proved. It led directly to his commissions for Rite of Spring and Petrushka, propelling him to his place as one of the giants of 20th century music.
